The conferences involved 110 children across 14 schools at the 4 full day pupil conferences in 4 different venues across the county. New E-Safety resources



Play Like Share: Keeping 8-10s safe online is a new set of resources from CEOP (National Crime Agency). At the heart of these excellent resources are three films that follow the adventures of Alfie, Ellie and Sam as they form a band and enter their school's Battle of the Bands contest, taking on the mean but 'cool' Popcorn Wizards as they go. The three friends learn that while the internet can help, they need to use it wisely and safely. The aim of the films is to help 8-10 year olds learn how to stay safe online. In particular, the

films and activities teach them to spot the early signs of manipulative, pressurising and threatening behaviour by people they might meet online, and develop their confidence to respond safely and get help. You'll need to create an account (free) if you haven't already done so but it's well worth it.

If you haven't seen the resources that Childnet produced a few months ago, those are well worth a look too. It's designed to support teachers in exploring critical thinking online. The 'Trust Me' resource has been created with



teachers in mind after hearing from schools that they wanted a resource which would start the conversations around extremism and extreme online content. I've used these resources with quite a few groups of children in a number of schools and they have always gone down very well. They can be downloaded [here](#). Safer Internet Day – Tuesday 7th February



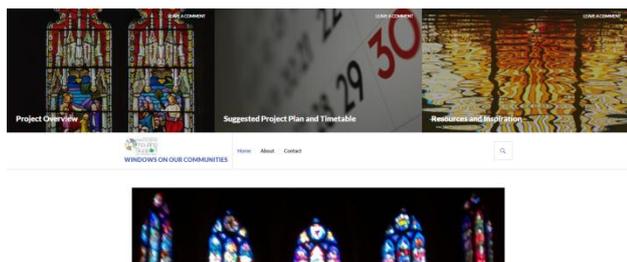
